LEARNER'S PERMIT

- * Mandatory six monthsøskill building before road test.
- * Certification of 65 hours behind-the-wheel skill building, including no less than 10 hours of nighttime driving and five (5) hours must be driven in poor weather conditions.
- * Supervising adult must be 21 or older.
- * Permit valid for one year.
- * Number of passengers must not exceed number of seat belts in vehicle.
- * Mandatory 90-day suspension for six-point or more accumulation, or a single high-speed conviction (26 m.p.h. or more over posted speed limit).

Junior Drivers License Act 81

- * 11 p.m. to 5 a.m. driving restriction.
- * Number of passengers must not exceed number of seat belts in vehicle.
- Mandatory 90-day suspension for six-point or more accumulation, or a single high-speed conviction (26 m.p.h. or more over posted speed limit).
- * You may not carry more than one (1) passenger under the age of 18 who is not an immediate family member unless supervised by an adult licensed driver who is in the vehicle with you. After the first six (6) months of driving on a junior license, the limit is increased to no more than three (3) passengers under the age of 18 who are not immediate family members unless your parent(s) or guardian(s) is in the vehicle. The increased limit does not apply to any junior driver who has ever been involved in a crash in which they were partially or fully responsible or who is convicted of any driving violation.

FULL UNRESTRICTED LICENSURE

- * Possible with:
- * Crashó and conviction-free record for 12 months.
- * Completion of an approval driverøs education course.
- * If you have a regular license and you are under age 18, the following still apply:
- * Number of passengers must not exceed number of seat belts in vehicle
- Mandatory 90-day suspension for six-point or more accumulation, or a single high-speed conviction (26 m.p.h. or moreover posted speed limit.

BASIC FACTS ABOUT TEEN DRIVING

- * Motor vehicle crashes remain the #1 cause of death for adolescents.
- * One in five ninth through 11th graders has been involved in at least one crash as a passenger in the past year.
- * The fatality risk of drivers aged 16-17 years is 3.6 times higher when they are driving with passengers than they are driving alone.
- * The per mile crash for teenaged drivers is 3 times higher after 9:00 pm.
- * The greatest lifetime chance of crashing occurs in the first 6 months after license.

TIPS FOR PARENTS

- Cell phone calls and texting increase crash risk significantly, and teens are particularly affected.
 Research shows that texting while driving can take your eyes off the road for an average of almost five seconds.
 In 2009, 16 percent of all fatal crashes for people under the age of 20 were reported to involve distracted driving.
- * Nearly half the teens that died in car crashes in 2009 were killed between 3 p.m. and midnight.
- * The presence of even one passenger increases the chance of a fatal crash, and the presence of just one male passenger nearly doubles those odds.
- * Using lap/shoulder belts can reduce the risk of dying in a car crash by 45%.
- * In 2009, speed-related crashes accounted for 34% of fatalities among 16-to-19-year-olds.
- * Thirteen percent of high school seniors reported driving under the influence of marijuana, a number nearly equivalent to those who reported driving under the influence of alcohol.
- * Good grades aren¢t just important for your teen¢s future career, they are also indicative of safe driving behavior. When riding as a passenger in a car driven by a teen, help the driver get to your destination safely by: Not having more people in the car than is allowed by law, Discourage cell phone use and texting while driving, Refuse to get into the car when driver is drunk or drugged, and avoid situations and teen drivers that you feel could place your safety at risk.
